A Statement of which the above is a copy was by the directions of M^r Carr produced to the Trustees (J.C. Dowdeswell Esq[ui]r[e] and the Rev^d T. Rackett) at M^r Dowdeswell's Chambers in Southampton Buildings on the 12th of December 1822 M^r Carr being then present and the same having been approved by the Trustees was ordered to be reported to the Master.

Since the foregoing account was taken the following alterations have taken place and refer to the red letters in the margin

The Paddles (a) have been found

The Sun Shades (b) have also been found

The Mahogany Bookcase (c) there is reason to believe was removed by (M^r Wallis a late Trustee) for the purpose of keeping the papers belonging to the Garrick Estate in

The Tambour frame (d) has been found

The transparent blinds (e) have also been found but quite decayed

Head of Shakespeare (f) in a white frame and ~~those~~ that of Sir W Raleigh ~~and Ben Johnson~~ (h) and (i) are supposed to be the three frames with canvas on them (but the painting almost obliterated) in the Laundry at Hampton.

p. 3 The Earl of Essex (g) has been found

A painting on glass (k) M^{rs} Garrick some years since presented to his present Majesty in consequence of the kings having expressed great satisfaction at seeing her husband's likeness so well preserved.

Seven Chair Cushions and 2 Mahogany Tables (l) were stolen from the Temple not valued.

The Hay (m) it is presumed was used by the Horses which with the Carriages were left to M^{rs} Garrick by her Husband and the Hay is therefore not valued.

It is imagined that the greater part of the Articles contained in the foregoing particulars and not accounted for in the above statement have been worn out by use and time, and query if the Executors of M^{rs} Garricks will are (under the terms of M^r Garricks Will) liable for such wear and tear and if they are, then I estimate the same at the sum of £88 5s 0d
