Gentlemen,

To the Executer [*sic*] of the Late M<sup>rs</sup> Garrick I am very much Shocked and hurt at what M<sup>r</sup> Carr should have said of me .. M<sup>rs</sup> Carr ask me where the Stouff [*possibly* Stoull] was that was in my M<sup>rs</sup> s Room: and I told her M<sup>r</sup> Dean man had taken it. She said I should not have Let it gone .. I told her I had no Power to Prevent Anny thing going .. I simply said to Mr Denn Man that that I thought The Cover Might Belong to the Estate Room and there it Ended I Scentainly [*certainly*] Said it was going to M<sup>r</sup> Rackett. if Gentleman you are not Satisfied With those Lines in my Defence I am willing to Come to town Anny Day the Gentleman will Apint [*appoint*] to Meet Mrs Carr ... Mrs Carr is Too very Peticurlar that I take Caution to all my words and Action  
I Remain Gentlemen your Ever obliged and Truly Dutifull Servant
